Memorial Tree and Time Capsule – Pete Tiernan



Pete stopped by our 50th Anniversary tree at Fern Park and was pleased to say that it is flourishing.

Too young to bear acorns yet but almost tripled in height since we planted it in 2016.

The capstone covering to time capsule is sinking and he will ask WHDPW to please prop it up again.

For those new members, here is a little history.

Past president Bob Hill's (2015-2016) administration conceived the idea for the memorial. Bob spoke a few words describing the meaning of the tree, headstone, and capsule. The tree to remember the men who got together one day and said; Let's start a group based on fellowship and volunteerism. Those founders probably never thought that the group would last 50 years. Bob said, the thinking at the time they were planning was to create something that would last another 50+ years. He described the capsule being water tight stainless steel. The items in the capsule represent that The Old Guard is flourishing today as it did in the past, with all the positive things we are doing today. Volunteering to the many charities we are still associated with and learning through the wonderful speakers we have at every meeting. The headstone represents the permanency of the Old Guard and that it would last another 50-100 years. Bob reminded us that there needs to be care taken to maintain the headstone so that grass does not grow over the surface hiding the memory and to respect the past.

UCONN Hospital - Bill O'Connor

The longstanding relationship between UCONN and the Old Guard continues. UCONN has reorganized some of its services at the Muscular Skeleton Institute at 120 Dowling Way to better service the community. Your volunteering plans for 2024 2025 and can include your service at the University Hospital in Farmington.

The need has greatly increased as now all Physical Therapy including Occupational Therapy has moved to the Institute on Dowling Way. Patients at the University

Muscular Skeleton Institute frequently require assistance with directions to their appointments and many require the use of a wheelchair.

Volunteers serve a 4-hour shift 8 to noon or noon to 4 Monday, Wednesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays. Some training is required per HIPPA rules. This is a rewarding activity for our service.

10/1 – Kristen Sullivan, Director of Elections, Office of the CT Secretary of State.




Kristin Sullivan is an election law expert who joined the Office of the Secretary of the State in July 2023 as Connecticut's Director of Elections. With a public policy career that spans more than 20 years and includes time in both the public and nonprofit sectors, she has worked with a diverse group of legislators, election officials, advocates, and nonprofit leaders. As Director of Elections, she works with the Secretary of the State and local election officials across the state's 169 municipalities to ensure secure, fair, and accessible elections for all Connecticut voters.

Prior to joining the Secretary of the State's Office, Kristin served as Research Director at the Center for Election Innovation & Research. While at CEIR, she collaborated with a broad coalition of stakeholders—including advocates, academia, state and local officials, and the media—to drive evidence-based policy aimed at restoring trust in elections and promoting innovative solutions around voter engagement and election integrity. Previously, Kristin was Chief Legislative Analyst at the Connecticut General Assembly's Office of Legislative Research focusing primarily on federal, state, and local election administration, voting rights, and campaign finance laws. She guided a diverse team in providing comprehensive support to the legislature across multiple disciplines through in-depth policy research and legislative analysis.

Kristin holds a Master of Public Administration from Columbia University's School of International and Public Affairs and a Bachelor of Science in Education from Miami University in Oxford, Ohio. As Director of Elections for Connecticut, she is a member of the National Association of State Election Directors (NASED) and a board member of the Electronic Registration Information Center (ERIC).

10/8 - Bryan Cafferelli - Commissioner, CT Department of Consumer Protection



Bryan T. Cafferelli was appointed Commissioner of the Connecticut Department of Consumer Protection (DCP) in March 2023. From January 2019 to his appointment as commissioner, Mr. Cafferelli served as legal counsel of the Connecticut Senate Republican Office where he was responsible for providing counsel to senators and caucus staff with legal and legislative matters, including drafting processes, procedures, and policy.

Previously, he served as a drug control attorney for DCP from April of 2017 to January of 2019. In this position, he was responsible for managing the agency's prescription drug enforcement cases, including all aspects of administrative action, rulemaking processes, and statutory and regulatory development. He has also previously worked as special deputy assistant state's attorney for the Office of the State's Attorney in the Judicial District of Stamford, and as chief of staff and legal counsel for former Lt. Governor Michael Fedele.

Cafferelli earned a Bachelor of Arts in political science from the University of South Carolina and a Juris Doctor from the University of Connecticut School of Law.

10/15 - Josiah Brown - Executive Director of Connecticut CASA – Court Appointed Special Advocates representing children whose families are tangled in the court system.



Josiah H. Brown is the executive director of a statewide Connecticut CASA organization, after having served as founding executive director of CASA of Southern Connecticut, part of the national CASA network for children who have experienced abuse or neglect and are in need of court-appointed special advocates. Before, he was the first associate director of the Yale-New Haven Teachers Institute. He worked with New Leaders for a summer during its start-up and was responsible for researching prospective partner cities. Previously, he was chief of staff to the president of the New School (Jonathan Fanton). In earlier roles, Brown was an aide to U.S. Representative Rosa DeLauro and to the director of a center at Columbia University. He worked for UConn Upward Bound and ConnPIRG and has volunteered with various urban youth organizations and public schools. He has a B.A. with distinction in history, magna cum laude, from Yale and a master's in public policy from Harvard, where he co-chaired a Kennedy School student nonprofit management group and was a member of the Social Enterprise Club at Harvard Business School. At the Kennedy School, he and a classmate, Corinne Herlihy, co-authored a report on out-ofschool programs and policy for the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. A former president of Domestic Violence Services of Greater New Haven, he chairs the Literacy Coalition of Greater New Haven. At Yale, since 2008 he has been an associate fellow of Saybrook College. He is an occasional contributor to the Connecticut Mirror, Good Men Project, New Haven Independent, and Times of India. He and his wife, Sahar Usmani-Brown, live in New Haven with their children.

Brown attended rural public schools in Windham County, Connecticut for nine years. On a partial scholarship, he then attended Groton School. He has a bachelor's degree from Yale and a master's in public policy from Harvard's Kennedy School of Government.

10/22 – Mike Magee, MD – University of Hartford Presidents College – Al in Medicine



Dr. Mike Magee is a medical historian and journalist, and the author of *Code Blue: "Inside the Medical Industrial Complex"* (Atlantic Monthly Press, 2019). He has taught at the Presidents' College and the C. Everett Koop Institute at Dartmouth's Geisel School of Medicine and Jefferson Medical College. He was also an Honorary Master Scholar at the NYU School of Medicine and the 2008 Distinguished Alumnus award recipient from the University of North Carolina School of Medicine. He lives in West Hartford, CT, and is the author of the weekly blog <u>healthcommentary.org</u>.

10/29 - Dr. Jenna Bartley – UConn Health Dept. on Aging Nutrition, Exercise, Muscle Quality with Aging.



Dr. Bartley's research focuses on translational studies into human aging with a focus on how immune responses and physical function decline as we get older. My unique education and training in both human subject (kinesiology) and basic (immunology) research allows me to understand and design research on multiple levels, from basic benchtop research and preclinical studies to human clinical studies. She believes to tackle many age-associated issues successfully a multifaceted, multisystem-based approach truly is necessary. Her multidisciplinary research aims to uncover common pathways among the aging process and to develop potential interventions to prevent age-related declines in immune responses and help older adults maintain their independence into late life.
